University Examinations are conducted as per the norms and regulations of the University of Kerala.

Continuous evaluation is done based on the marks for attendance, assignments/seminars and internal exams as per the guidelines of the University of Kerala.

#### 6.3.4 Research and Development

The Physics and Chemisry departments are approved research centres of the University of Kerala, which carry out research leading to Ph.D. The faculty members are encouraged to do research under FDP of UGC. Major and minor research projects are taken up by faculty members. Student projects are also taken up by the institution.

#### 6.3.5 Library, ICT and physical infrastructure / instrumentation

New books were added to the college library. A new building was constructed for the college women's hostel. Laboratory facilities were improved.
